

MUSIC IS ALL AROUND US

Who doesn't love music?

Music surrounds us on a daily basis wherever we may find ourselves. Whether we are at a shopping centre, the supermarket, in the car, on hold during a phone call or simply at home.

On my recent holiday cruise to Vanuatu and New Caledonia, I was privileged to enjoy and appreciate music in many different settings.

On the cruise ship there are many locations which integrate music as part of their environment and aesthetics. The Elemis Spa has soft music in the background whilst remedial massage and treatments are performed. The music provides the perfect ambience for a calm and soothing environment in a very tranquil setting enhancing the experience for the client.

In the gymnasium, the music is more upbeat in order to motivate and stimulate the trainer whilst doing his workout.

The Marquee is the main theatre on the cruise ship where live shows are performed. These can be singing and dancing extravaganzas, magic and illusion or comedy acts. In each case music is selected to tell a story or complement the particular show. For example, the magic and illusion show utilise suspenseful music in the background to raise the apprehension of the audience and alert them to possible danger.

The Deck 5 Atrium is a very busy and noisy area with many people coming and going all the time. The music in this area is piped through the speakers, some of it upbeat and some quite laidback. Between 5 and 9 pm various musicians perform in this area. There is a pianist who plays and sings songs written by Elton John, Billy Joel et al. There is a husband and wife duo with backing band who perform 70's, 80's and 90's music and there is a young guitarist who plays and sings, but does his own interpretation of other famous musicians' songs. In this time slot passengers are generally transitioning between happy hour, dinner and the shows. The entertainers do their best to include the passengers by getting them to sing along, clap or request their favourite songs. One of the artists on board my cruise was Jayden Sierra, who was a contestant on The X Factor back in 2012.

By far the most popular topic for Trivia in the lounges and bars is music. Passengers flock to the bars and lounges in droves to participate in the trivia: Name the song, Name the artist or band, What's the next line? Famous movie songs/themes are just a few of the categories that are played in Trivia.

The Big Screen Monitor on the Lido Deck or Deck 14 is the ideal location to screen live feed from cameras around the ship, especially on sail away or special event parties where a live band or DJ is performing. They also screen live concerts, movies and football matches on the big screen. This area has many people lounging outside, in the pools or spas, at the bars, ice cream kiosk or at the burger place and everyone can hear what is on the big screen.

Upon return to our cabins the television is tuned to the update channel. The room stewards do this for us each time they refresh our rooms. This channel continuously displays the ship's position, weather forecast, wind speeds, wave height and nautical miles travelled with background music playing all the time. By the end of the cruise I was singing along to the tunes.

First port of call was Port Vila, Vanuatu and the Island Discovery tour which included a trip to the *Pepeyo Cultural Village*. This tour provided an insight into village life where the tribal leader's son shared many stories about how they have kept their heritage, traditions and religion to this day.

At the conclusion of our tour the tribal villagers performed a welcome song using musical instruments which they make themselves. See photo below.

Instruments consisting of short or long sticks were banged on a wooden log by the women in the tribe. Bottles of various sizes and shapes filled with differing amounts of water were played with two short sticks, which produced an incredible sound which echoed and reverberated. There were hollow bamboo sticks in varying lengths, which were struck with a flexible piece of material, such as a flip-flop cut down to size. The sound produced by this instrument was more of a percussion sound similar to that of a xylophone. The only other

conventional instruments used were guitars and the villagers all sang beautifully in tune.

On a final note, I was very disappointed that there were no classical musicians or music on this cruise. Time to start planning the next destination – the Caribbean maybe?

TO JAPAN BY CRUISE

Member DDZ (David de Zilwa) boarded the Queen Elizabeth to cruise three weeks from Melbourne to Yokohama (the port for Tokyo). Along the way, he practised piano on board (with approval from the Cruise Director) and occasionally filled in for one of the cocktail pianists for 20 minutes here and there during their scheduled timeslots. On arrival in Japan, David took the bullet train down to Kyoto and met up with Hiroko, former FPFF member and host. She organised tickets for a performance of Tchaikovsky's piano concerto No. 2 - a great experience, enjoyed by both of them. Also, David visited Hiroko's home and had a muso session on her wonderful grand piano. During the cruise, DDZ fine-tuned repertoire for an upcoming charity concert featuring piano solos with a theme of "contemporary and classic British piano".

Further exploits included flying to Sri Lanka from Tokyo, arriving five days after the Easter Sunday terrorist suicide bombings, where the country was in shock. 10 days later in a country town largely devoid of tourists who had cancelled their holidays, DDZ played piano at the Grand Hotel high tea. A MEETING WITH MAX

Mr Ed decided to interview Max Cooke OAM for this edition. Rather than email Max a set of questions, he visited Max personally for a chat. Max is Director and founder of the Team of Pianists, and probably the most famous living pianist in Melbourne.

We sat facing his upright piano, and on it along with other music, was a copy of 'Tone Touch and Technique', a book for students which he wrote and is in use today. He invited Mr Ed to pick it up and thumb through it. Thinking of books, "Max Cooke's Life In Music, A Pedagogue On The Platform" is a book written by himself and Fay Woodhouse in 2010. It's a fascinating read and has been popular among members. If you want to know more about Max, or about other characters on the piano scene, this is essential reading.

Max, thank you for agreeing to be interviewed for the FOTOPS Newsletter:

Mr.Ed: How and when did you become a pianist?

Max: My mother played piano by ear and I enjoyed listening to her. At the age of seven years, my father arranged for me to start having lessons, so that I could learn to play piano properly and

to read music. It all continued from then.

Mr.Ed: How did you start the Team of Pianists?

Max: At the time when Darryl Coote and Robert Chamberlain had completed their studies, Darryl

wanted to do post-graduate studies wanted to perform in concerts. There was a need to set up opportunities for them. Rohan Murray was at Monash University and was completing his studies. It was also a fact that we were all based in Melbourne, and I saw a need to create regular concerts for solo and for chamber music at Rippon Lea. I devised a six-concert series to be spread across a year at several venues. I thought of the name "Team of Pianists' as I

was stepping out of my shower one morning.

Mr.Ed: Do you also play another instrument?

Max: My father had a friend who played french horn at school, Trinity Grammar, so I started

playing that. At University, I learned oboe for a year. I then studied double bass to the level required by the Conservatorium. I can also play pipe organ. I also learned harpsicord, an instrument that I really came to enjoy, and the playing of it also opened opportunities for me

to play and perform when I was in Europe.

Mr.Ed: You have travelled the world, so do you have a favourite venue that you love to perform in?

Max: I nominate the Hall in Freiberg im Breisgau, a university town in south-west Germany in the

Black Forest region, near the French border. This music hall was once a fruit and vegetable

market. I also love performing in the Melba Hall at Melbourne University.

MrEd: Do you have a favourite composer or piece of music?

Max: My favourite composer is Bach. I particularly enjoy playing and listening to Rachmaninoff's

Concertos I, II and III.

MrEd: What is your favourite ice-cream?

Max: Any ice-cream with chocolate topping.

KEYNOTING A MUSICIAN

ROY SHEPHERD MBE 1907-1986

Roy Shepherd was an Australian pianist, born in Geelong and most well known for his teaching work at the University of Melbourne Conservatorium of Music. In 1925 he won the William Clarke Scholarship to study at the Royal College of Music London, where he stayed for four years. He added more time studying under Alfred Cortot in France. Returning in 1934, he taught at the Melbourne Conservatorium before being appointed head of music at Geelong College in 1936.

From the mid-1950s to 1963 he returned to the Conservatorium. Max Cooke first met him at the Conservatorium and was taught by him. Roy was invited by the Ecole Normale to teach in Paris during this period. Bernard Heinz appointed Max in his place to take on his good students for a year. Upon his return, he was not very happy that some of his students opted to continue with Max. Roy was awarded the MBE in 1978 for his contribution to music.
